# About the Trauma Informed Practice (TIP) project

The EITP\* Trauma Informed Practice (TIP) project is a workforce development project that has been funded through the cross departmental funded Early Intervention Transformation Programme (EITP) and is housed in the SBNI. strategic training being delivered across organisations in Northern Ireland.

The Trauma Informed Practice project aims to ensure that SBNI member agencies:

- Have an awareness of the adverse childhood experiences which cause trauma in a child's life;
- Are aware of the impact of these adversities on the development of a child;
- Are able to identify what creates resilience to cope with adversity; and
- Are able to develop policies and practices to embed trauma informed practice in their work.

This SBNI is working within five sectors to build the capacity of the workforce in their understanding of ACEs and trauma informed practice skills development. These sectors are Community and Voluntary; Education; Health; Justice, and Social Care. In addition the project team are also working across sport, arts, housing, the Northern Ireland Ambulance Service and Interfaith Committees in Northern Ireland.

The EITP Trauma Informed Practice Project consists of a number of elements of workforce development for identified professionals and volunteers across these sectors including:

- Level 1 Ace Awareness;
- Level 2 Trauma Sensitive Approaches to Practice Skills Development;
- Training the Trainer Programme of Professional Development; and
- Be the Change Leadership Programme

This report card presents the performance data for those activities and additional development opportunities that have been delivered up to end of July 2019.

## Summary of progress

- In the period April to July 2019 more than 1,300 stakeholders were engaged in the project which includes 517 who were trained as part of the Level 1 Ace Awareness training.
- A total of 66 events were organised and delivered to these stakeholders from across the Health & Social Care, Education, Justice and Community & Voluntary sectors.
- Uptake at these events was high with more than 80% of those who registered having attended.
- The training secured improvements in all targeted areas (knowledge & understanding of ACEs, confidence and skills in using an ACE lens approach, levels of self-care and empathy).
- The highest levels of impact were in relation to participants':
  - > ability to use an ACE lens approach to intervene and signpost vulnerable families to an appropriate service (45 % average improvement in score).
  - > confidence to respond appropriately to vulnerable families (17% average improvement in score).
- NI ACE Animation has been viewed over 3,000 times between April and July 2019
- Significant amount of activity undertaken to underpin the development of the TIP project including, for example:
  - The participation of 100 children and young people in the Life Changers programme (funded by the SBNI) from a series of Barnardo's support programmes which contributed to the ACE awareness training resources;
- The participation and contributions of 60 individuals from 32 organisations in the NI ACE conference 2019 has contributed to the leadership alignment and commitment to the ACE agenda in Northern Ireland. These agencies will be supported from September 2019 onwards through the 'Be the Change' Leadership Programme of the project.








#### SESSION DELIVERY AND ATTENDANCE – PLANNED VS. ACTUAL












